Dear Sir:

We are sending under separate registered cover the information for which you wrote my brother last November. It has taken sometime to get these papers together but trust that you will find them satisfactory for your work.

The introduction in our genealogy is, "Charles DeWolf of Guadeloupe, his ancestors and descendants, being a complete genealogy of the Rhode Island DeWolfs. The descendants of Simon DeWolf with their common descendant from Balthasar DeWolf of Lyme, Conn. (1668). This Genealogy is written by Rev. Calbraith B. Perry D.D., New York Press of T. A. Wright 1902".

I have numbered the names in accordance with the system an acquaintance has used and which I understand is in common use. The arrangement of the dashes may be misleading, and as there is only one instance where there are more than nine children, I would suggest that you ignore the dashes. In the one instance I have placed paranthesis around the "10" corresponding to the tenth child.

All names that are carried on are marked with a check at the right of the name, and you will find these names on another sheet, with the corresponding number, showing their children. Names marked with an X do not carry on. Where the name changes from Diman by marriage I have not carried these names on after listing their children, such names are not marked by check or X.

Joseph Diman, who was born in 1748, and married Margaret DeWolf, is the first Diman in the Genealogy which we have, and simply mentions Jeremiah as Joseph's father. From your letter we learn that Jeremiah's father was Thomas, Thomas' father was James and James' father was Thomas who died in 1682, but we do not know anything about the descendants of any of them outside of Jeremiah. Have you anything about the above three, ancestors of Jeremiah, which would be of interest to us to have?

You will note that none of the children of William C.(112222) carry on here. This William C. is my father's uncle, making his children our second cousins. We do not know anything about them and wondered if possibly you might have some information that would help us to locate them?

If there are any questions about this work we are sending please let us know, sending the number we have given and we shall be very glad to do what we can for you.

I have also made a copy of the "Dimon Family" as given in "Howell's History of Southampton", enclosed herewith, which I ran across the other day, and thought it might be of some help to you in the other branches of the offspring of the first Thomas Dimon, who married Mary Sheaffe.

We wish you all success in your work and shall be very glad to know when your genealogy is completed. Trusting we shall hear from you in the near future, I am
